Iran Warns Israel against More 'Military Adventures'; Majid Takht Ravanchi, the Iranian ambassador to the UN, slammed Israel on Thursday, October 14, claiming that “over the past months, the number and intensity of Israeli regime provocative and adventurous threats have steadily increased to alarming levels.” He sent the complaint to the head of the UN Security Council, a report at Tasnim News in Iran said on Thursday. Takht Ravanchi has slammed Israel in the past. Several weeks ago, he complained about Israeli Prime Minister Naftali Bennett’s speech, claiming it was “full of lies.” Bennett has said that Iran was trying to dominate the region. “Iran-phobia runs rampant at the UN. The Israeli regime PM’s speech was full of lies on Iran,” the Iranian said. Now Iran is angry about comments reported from Israel. He says that Israel’s IDF Chief of Staff has warned of “operational plans” against Iran. “Operations to destroy Iran's capabilities in various fields will continue at any time,” was the quote that has Iran up in arms. “Our protests against the regime's previous threats in 2021 are reflected in our letters to the UN Security Council on February 1, April 12, August 27 and September 14,” the Iranians say. Iran says there are explicit systematic threats by the Israeli “regime” and that this constitutes a violation of international law, in particular Article 2 (4) of the Charter of the United Nations. This coming from the same country whose leaders often threaten to destroy Israel. In this case, it appears hypocritical of Iran to complain about Israeli comments. But the Iranians are complaining nonetheless. “The fact that the Israeli regime continues to ‘destroy Iran's capabilities’ proves without a doubt that it has been responsible for terrorist attacks against our peaceful nuclear program in the past,” Iran says. “Given the ominous history of the Israeli regime's destabilizing practices in the region, as well as its covert operations against Iran's nuclear program, the regime must be dealt with to stop all threats and disruptive behavior,” Iran says, according to the Tasnim report. Iran in this sense is playing the victim, which is interesting. It basically admits it has a dangerous nuclear program, but at the same time wants that program to be protected – which shows that Iran is concerned about Israel’s recent comments and actions.

Iran Threatens 'Harsh Response' after Alleged Israeli Airstrike in Syria; Iranian militias warned of a "harsh response" after a number of Syrian and Iranian-backed forces were killed and wounded in an alleged Israeli airstrike near Palmyra in central Syria on Wednesday night, October 13, the second such airstrike in the past week. The Syrian state news agency SANA reported that an Israeli airstrike targeted a communications tower and a number of nearby sites, killing one Syrian soldier and wounding three others. The strike was carried out from the direction of the al-Tanf area near the Jordanian and Iraqi borders with Syria, a Syrian

military source told SANA. Around the time of the airstrike, the airspace above the Golan Heights was closed to flights until Friday, October 15, at 12:15 a.m. On Thursday morning, a joint operations room affiliated with the Islamic Revolutionary Guards Corps, Hezbollah and the Assad regime warned that it has decided to respond harshly to the airstrikes after a number of operatives were killed and wounded in them, according to Hezbollah-affiliated media. It is unclear if the statement was referring to casualties other than those reported by SANA. The joint operations room stressed that its mission in Syria is only to help the Syrian state to confront "terrorists" and ISIS. "For years, we have been subjected to attacks from the Israeli and American enemy in an attempt to drag us into side battles that were not a priority for our presence in Syria, and the Zionists' excuse was that they were targeting accurate weapons and sensitive equipment that posed a threat to their usurping entity," added the joint statement. Hamas spokesperson Hazem Qassem condemned the alleged Israeli airstrikes on Thursday morning as well, calling them a "blatant aggression and outrageous thuggery." Qassem stressed that Israel could only be deterred by confronting it, responding to its attacks, making it "pay the price" for its actions and not allowing it to impose the rules of engagement. Before last week's airstrike, the last one blamed on Israel in Syria took place in August, targeting the Qalamoun Mountains near the capital Damascus. Four Syrian civilians were reportedly killed when Syrian air defense missiles fell in a residential area in the town of Qara.

Israel Expects Hezbollah to Fire 2,000 Rockets per Day in Wartime; Israel does not want war with Hezbollah, but is prepared to face about 2,000 rockets a day from the terror group if conflict breaks out, a senior Israeli military official told AFP. During the 11-day May conflict between Israel and Hamas in the Gaza Strip, Palestinian terror groups fired around 4,400 projectiles towards the Jewish state. The Iron Dome air defense system intercepted around 90 percent of the rockets headed for populated areas, while just under 300 hit inhabited districts. Cities like Tel Aviv and Ashdod experienced the "highest number of fire towards them in the history of Israel," said Uri Gordin, chief of the army's Home Front Command. "We saw a pace of more than 400 rockets fired towards Israel on a daily basis." Gordin said that in the case of a future "conflict or a war with Hezbollah, we expect more than five times the number of rockets fired every day from Lebanon to Israel." "Basically, we are looking at between 1,500 and 2,500 rockets fired daily towards Israel," he told AFP. An Israeli security source told AFP that the IDF is hoping for "stability" with its northern neighbor, which is mired in a crippling economic crisis, and on Thursday, October 14, saw deadly sectarian clashes in the capital Beirut that left seven dead, including Hezbollah members. The Iranian-backed Hezbollah is "the source of instability in Lebanon," the security source said, adding that the group "exploits the state's resources for Iranian interests." Iran is "closer to creating fissile material for nuclear weapons than they ever were in the past" but would still need two years to obtain a bomb, the source said, echoing a timeframe cited by other Israeli officials. "We are preparing for all options and scenarios, including military capabilities," the security source said.

China Strengthens Diplomatic Ties with Iran, Russia; On Friday, October 16, China's top diplomats affirmed the country's commitment to strengthen its strategic partnership with Iran in a phone call with Iranian officials. The CCP vowed to help Iran combat issues including unilateral bullying, defending international fairness and justice and helping Iran achieve its nuclear ambitions. In the phone conversation with Iranian Foreign Minister Hossein Amir Abdollahian, Chinese State Councilor and Foreign Minister Wang Yi said no matter how the international and regional situation changes, China would make efforts for greater development of the China-Iran comprehensive strategic partnership. In addition, China has been running joint military drills with Russia as the two countries attempt to challenge American hegemony. This comes as China is planning to develop its military in hopes to have the strongest global force by 2049.

Hundreds of Medical Interns and Residents across Israel Quit; Hundreds of medical interns and residents from across Israel handed in their letters of resignation on Monday, October 18, which will take effect in 14 days.

The interns worked at 35 hospital wards nationwide, according to KAN. "This is only the first phase," the Mirsham union for medical residents said in a statement, adding that more resignations could soon follow, according to N12. "If the outline for shortening shifts does not change, resignation letters will be submitted in the coming days in dozens of additional departments throughout the hospitals in Israel." Mirsham had made efforts to negotiate with the Health Ministry, but these talks have stalled. The resignation is due to longstanding protests against the fact that they work 26-hour shifts, often without any break to rest or even eat or go to the bathroom for several hours, due to the immense overload in hospitals. "We did not believe we would reach this difficult day," Mirsham said. "Our commitment is to our patients, those who put their lives in our hands - we can not continue to give them the medical care they deserve, we can not continue to endanger them and ourselves in 26-hour shifts." Discussions were held late Saturday night, October 16, in an effort to quash the threat of the large-scale resignation, which came into effect Sunday morning. The crisis has been brewing since at least late September, with the threat of resignations looming since the beginning of October. On October 17, medical students from all Israeli faculties marched in central Tel Aviv in support of hundreds of interns and residents who had already resigned their positions as part of the battle to shorten the length of hospital shifts. Over 300 students, from Tel Aviv University, Ben-Gurion University of the Negev, Technion-Israel Institute of Technology, Ariel University and the Hebrew University of Jerusalem also signed the petition claiming they would resign – and as a result, decided to strike in support.

Aliyah Resolutions to Alleviate Tech, Engineering, Medical Labor Shortages; The cabinet approved two government resolutions designed to reduce labor shortages in hi-tech and the medical professions, including doctors and nurses. The resolutions, which are supposed to streamline the immigration process for those professionals and encourage them to make aliyah, were advanced by Aliyah and Integration Minister Pnina Tamano-Shata. She said immigrants help drive Israel's economy forward, and that the government must make full use of this potential. The first resolution will see the establishment of an inter-ministerial working group to form an operational program to encourage aliyah among potential immigrants with qualifications in engineering and hi-tech. It will also establish a mechanism to connect these professionals with potential employers in Israel before they have even made aliyah. The labor force is currently lacking some 13,000 to 20,000 engineers and hi-tech personnel, the Aliyah Ministry said on Sunday, October 17, with 60% of hi-tech firms reporting difficulties in hiring appropriate staff. The ministerial working group, with representatives from numerous government ministries and economic bodies, will not only seek to encourage Jews in the Diaspora with relevant qualifications to make aliyah but also try to persuade Israeli citizens living abroad with such qualifications to return to the country. The placement mechanism to be created by the Aliyah Ministry together with the Jewish Agency will connect hi-tech aliyah candidates with potential Israeli employers before the immigrants come to Israel. Hi-tech companies will be able to evaluate these potential employees, and the immigrants themselves will be able to obtain placement with relevant companies before they even arrive. "Immigrants are the best form of growth for the Israeli economy," said Tamano-Shata. "This resolution will allow thousands of applicants who have expressed interest in aliyah to integrate into Israeli industry, which will obtain skilled and experienced labor." The second resolution will see the establishment of another inter-ministerial committee that, similar to the hi-tech and engineering resolution, will draft a placement program for potential immigrants who are qualified doctors and nurses in cooperation with hospitals and medical health providers. "Assisting new immigrants to integrate into a variety of jobs in hospitals is very welcome and will provide experienced, quality and professional manpower to those hospitals who will themselves be able to actualize twin missions: Zionist and medical," said Finance Minister Avigdor Liberman.

Israeli Startup Looks to Fight Pollution with Crowd-Cleaning Platform; An Israeli start-up has created the world's first crowd-cleaning platform designed to incentivize users to clean up the environment. The CleanCoin app launched five weeks ago in Israel, allows users to easily report or clean up trash piles around them and earn prizes. "I knew I wanted to create a company that would do good for the world, and I had a lot of ideas," said Gal Lahat, the company's 21-year-old co-founder and CTO. "I travel a lot and feel very

connected to nature, and it is heartbreaking when you encounter a big pile of litter in a beautiful spot or see a fish trapped in plastic bags. I had an idea that I thought would be simple to implement and have a really big impact.” The app is simple to use. When you see a pile of litter outdoors, you can take pictures and upload them to the app, where they are tagged on a map and automatically given a score. Then you can either clean up the pile yourself or leave it for someone else to clean. Whoever cleans it up can report it to the system and earn “CleanCoins,” which can be exchanged for real-life rewards. “The rewards are actually quite worthwhile and pay better than food delivery,” Lahat said. “It comes out to about NIS 10 for one trash bag, which can take about two minutes to fill. We offer some virtual rewards, like upgrading your avatar on the app and things like that. But we also offer great physical rewards, like a free night stay at Abraham Hostels or free clothing from Billabong.” Rewards are the product of agreements the company has made with suppliers, and many prominent brands have been more than happy to cooperate, Lahat said, adding: “We have deals with travel companies, surf clubs, wall-climbing centers, Azrieli and more.” Cash payouts may also be possible in the future through partnerships with local municipalities, he said. The reception of the app since its launch last month has been overwhelming, said Adam Ran, CleanCoin’s co-founder and CEO. About 18,000 users have already downloaded and registered on the app, with more joining every day. “It is amazing how quickly this has taken off,” he said. “Everyone wants to help out and be involved.”

Diver Pulls 900-year-old Crusader Sword from Sea Floor; A diver found a 900-year-old sword dating back to the Crusader period off the Carmel beach in the north of the country, along with various other artifacts, the Israel Antiquities Authority said Monday. Atlit resident Shlomi Katzin turned over the weapon to the Israel Antiquities Authority and was awarded a certificate of good citizenship. Katzin found the sword during a Saturday, October 16, dive in an area off the coast where waves and undercurrents had apparently shifted sand, revealing the item, the IAI said in a statement. Spying stone and metal anchors, Katzin also noticed the sword, which was encrusted with marine life. It has a one-meter blade and a 30-centimeter hilt. “The sword, which has been preserved in perfect condition, is a beautiful and rare find and evidently belonged to a Crusader knight,” said Nir Distelfeld, inspector for the IAI’s Robbery Prevention Unit. He assessed it is likely made of iron

Home of VFI Founders Nearly Destroyed by Fire; Barry and Batya Segal, founders of Vision for Israel, were recently evacuated from their home in Mevaseret Zion after a fire broke out in a nearby grove. Two houses were evacuated and firefighters and rescuers announced preparations to evacuate more houses. Large firefighters were called to the scene, and about an hour later fire control was achieved. The fire and rescue service said that around 10:30 PM, a call was received at the District Control Center about burning a grove near the house line at 57 Shoshana Street in the city of Mevaseret. It was also reported that additional forces were rushed to the scene from Jerusalem. A total of eight teams are working at the site. At the moment, the residents are being evacuated from the line of houses on the parallel street.

Iran Aspires to Build an Army on Israel's Golan Border; Iran aspires to build an army on Israel’s Golan Heights border, Prime Minister Naftali Bennett said on Monday, October 11, as he doubled down on Israeli sovereignty in that region and warned Tehran against continued entrenchment there. “The Golan Heights is Israel, period,” Bennett said as he addressed the Makor Rishon newspaper conference that focused on economic and regional development of the mountainous region that the Jewish state captured from Syria during the 1967 war. Israel applied sovereignty to the Golan, but that move has been recognized only by the United States. Jerusalem has long claimed that the region is a strategic necessity, particularly in light of the Syrian civil war and as one of the fronts in Iran’s continuous military battle with Israel. “Iran, which has dispatched proxies and built armies to surround the State of Israel, aspires to build yet another army on the border of the Golan Heights,” Bennett said as he stood in the Golan. “We will continue to act wherever and whenever necessary, at our initiative, and on a daily basis, in order to roll up the Iranian presence in Syria. They have nothing to look for there,” Bennett said. “Their adventure on our northern border needs to end.

Thus, we will ensure not only the peace of the residents of the Golan Heights but of all citizens of Israel,” he explained. But he clarified that Israel’s ties to the Golan were not dependent on the argument that it was territory necessary for Israel’s security. “I would like to make one thing clear – our position regarding the Golan Heights is not connected to the situation in Syria,” Bennett said. The “horrors taking place in Syria may make it seem as if it would be preferable for the Golan to prosper under Israeli hands” than to be “yet another arena for killings and bombings,” he said. “But even in the situation – which could happen – in which the world changes direction regarding Syria, or regarding the [Bashar] Assad regime, this has no connection to the Golan Heights” and Israeli sovereignty there. Golan Heights development is a strategic goal for this government, Bennett said, as he promised to double, if not quadruple the population there. In six weeks, the government will approve a national plan for the Golan Heights that will include the creation of two new communities and investment in development, infrastructure, business and renewable energy, Bennett said.

Talks With Iran Must be Renewed Urgently; Iran should rejoin negotiations to renew its deal with world powers to restrain its nuclear program, German Chancellor Angela Merkel said Sunday during a press conference with Prime Minister Naftali Bennett in Jerusalem. “Iran’s uranium enrichment has made the topic into an urgent matter,” she said. “The nuclear agreement is not ideal, but we are now in a difficult situation because the Iranians are not entering talks and are continuing to enrich uranium.” Iran left the talks in Vienna about a possible return to the 2015 nuclear deal in June and has been obfuscating whether it intends to return to negotiations ever since, while advancing its nuclear program farther than ever before. “Without an agreement, we will be in a worse situation,” Merkel said. “The message to Iran is unequivocal: Return to the negotiating table.” Bennett said the world “is waiting, and the Iranians are killing time, and the centrifuges are spinning.” Israel would ensure with actions, not just words, that Iran will never have a nuclear weapon because it would be an existential threat, he said. “One can only imagine the degree of damage [Iran] would cause if the world knew that behind their bullying is a nuclear weapon,” Bennett said. “There is no point in trying to appease the Iranians; they interpret appeasement as weakness... This is a critical time, and Germany’s position is very important.” Merkel was in Israel for a visit marking the end of her 16 years in office. Her likely replacement is Social Democrats leader Olaf Scholz, pending coalition negotiations. She held a one-on-one meeting with Bennett, joined a full cabinet meeting and met with President Isaac Herzog. “I want to use this opportunity to emphasize that the topic of Israel’s security will always be of central importance and a central topic of every German government,” Merkel said. “It is not only matters that affect our past that play a part, but also our look to a common future,” she said.

US Citizens to Enter Israel Without Green Pass; “Vaccinated tourists from the US will be allowed to enter Israel with their own health declaration despite not having an electronic Green Pass.” Head of Public Health Services Dr. Sharon Alroy-Preis said at the Jerusalem Post Conference on Tuesday, October 12. “They are going to get in with their own declaration of vaccination,” she said to senior health analyst Maayan Hoffman. “Once they get in, they have to submit their vaccination status and their certificates. A percentage of them will be inspected.” The visitors will be exempt from isolation provided that they meet the criteria of who is considered inoculated in Israel. “If they have a fresh vaccine booster or less than six months have passed since their first vaccine they will be allowed to receive a green pass in Israel to go around – and if not, they need to be in isolation for seven days and then take another PCR test.” Last week, Health Ministry Director-General Prof. Nachman Ash said that the authorities intend to reopen the borders to foreign nationals who are fully vaccinated as early as November. Last month, Jerusalem joined the EU’s digital COVID certificate program, ensuring mutual recognition of the documents such as the Green Pass. Non-citizens would be required to present an electronic Green Pass, which is used in Israel as well as in several other countries, but not in the US. Alroy-Preis points out how Israel now has some additional layers of protection in place, such as the PCR tests required of everyone before and after a flight. She said that from a health perspective, it may be best to keep the skies closed, but the goal is to learn how to live alongside COVID.

Israel to Alert Embassies Worldwide of Possible Iran Threats; Israel has warned its missions around the world of a possible Iranian terror threat, a television report claimed on Wednesday, October 6, following the arrest of an Azeri national over an alleged plot to assassinate one or more Israeli businesspeople in Cyprus. Israeli diplomats across the globe have been told to remain on high alert. The network also said three suspects in the foiled attack attempt in Cyprus, revealed earlier this week, are suspected of fleeing the island nation. Iran has been behind repeated threats against Israelis and Israeli missions around the world over the years. In March of this year, the National Security Council warned Israelis they could be targeted by the Islamic Republic abroad. It said Iran was behind a bombing attack near the Israeli embassy in India in January, which did not cause casualties. The Israeli government has blamed “Iranian terror” for last week’s reported plan to kill billionaire Teddy Sagi in Cyprus. However, local media reported Wednesday that Cypriot authorities do not believe Iran is behind the plot. Authorities are also said to be convinced the would-be hitman’s target in the plot was not Sagi, but other members of his company. Sagi is the founder of the gambling software company Playtech, which has offices in Nicosia. Some sources had claimed that the foiled attack was an assassination attempt against Sagi linked to his business dealings. But the Israeli government on Monday, October 5, blamed Iran and said Sagi was targeted only because he was an Israeli businessman. An Azeri suspect was arrested last week on reported suspicions of planning to attack one or more Israeli businesspeople. Cypriot authorities unsealed 11 possible charges the suspect is being investigated for, including terror activity, attempted murder, belonging to a criminal organization, conspiracy to commit a crime, and being in the country illegally. A lawyer for the suspect, whose name has not been released, told the Israeli network that his client denies any terror links and has nothing to hide.

Jordanian King Vows to Supply Lebanon with Electricity in Meeting with PM; Jordan’s King Abdullah II received Lebanon’s prime minister in Amman on Sunday, saying his country will stand by the small nation and its people during its worst-ever economic crisis. The visit to Jordan by Prime Minister Najib Mikati is his first to an Arab country since he formed his cabinet last month. It comes after the premier’s trips to France and Britain, as Mikati seeks their help. Lebanon’s economic crisis, unfolding since 2019, has been described by the World Bank as one of the worst in the world in 150 years. More than 70 percent of Lebanon’s population lives in poverty, and the national currency is in a freefall, driving inflation and unemployment to unprecedented levels. On Wednesday, October 6, Jordan agreed to supply Lebanon with electricity through Syria and work is underway for a timetable. Egypt has also agreed to supply Lebanon with natural gas to its power plants through Jordan and Syria. Lebanon suffers electricity cuts for up to 22 hours a day and on Saturday, October 9, the country’s two main power plants were forced to shut down after running out of fuel. That left Lebanon with no government-produced power. On Sunday, October 10, the Lebanese army gave emergency supplies of fuel to the two plants and they resumed work, according to Electricity Minister Walid Fayad. Jordan’s Royal Court quoted the king as telling Mikati that “Jordan will always stand by the side of Lebanon and its brotherly people.” It gave no further details but said the two officials discussed regional affairs as well.

Sally Rooney Novel Won’t be Published in Hebrew; Bestselling author Sally Rooney won’t allow her recently published novel, “Beautiful World, Where Are You?” to be published in Hebrew because she supports a cultural boycott of Israel. Like the acclaimed Irish author’s first two books, “Beautiful World” explores the life and romance of intellectual, urbane millennials. It debuted at the top of the New York Times bestseller list when it was published in September, following a publicity campaign that came on the heels of Rooney’s popular second novel, “Normal People,” which was also adapted into a TV series. That publicity campaign, however, will not be reaching Israel. The Hebrew-language publisher of Rooney’s first two books, Modan Publishing House, said last month that Rooney won’t allow her new book to be published in Hebrew because she supports an Israel boycott. Rooney’s agent confirmed the news. Rooney, 30, has been open about her opposition to Israel. In July, soon after the conflict between Israel and Hamas in Gaza, Rooney was one of the thousands of artists to sign a letter accusing Israel of apartheid and calling for its international isolation.

The letter called for “an end to the support provided by global powers to Israel and its military; especially the United States,” and for governments to “cut trade, economic and cultural relations.” Ireland has a history of pro-Palestinian sentiment, owing to what many Irish citizens see as a cultural link to their struggles against the British. This summer, the country passed a motion condemning “de facto annexation” of Palestinian land. In 2018, Dublin’s city council passed resolutions endorsing a boycott of Israel and calling for the expulsion of the Israeli ambassador to Ireland.

7-Eleven is Coming to Israel; Electra Consumer Products said Tuesday, October 12, it signed an agreement with the global 7-Eleven chain to open dozens of stores around Israel over the next three years, beginning with the launch of a Tel Aviv branch next year. The agreement is for 20 years, with an option to extend for another 50 years. "Unlike a "makolet" (Israeli convenience store), 7-Eleven offers an experience with fast food, a large variety of hot and cold drinks, and various products that do not exist elsewhere," Electra CEO Zvika Schwimmer said. "I am sure that the shopping experience at 7-Eleven will be different and special for the Israeli consumer." By the end of 2024, Electra is expected to invest over NIS 60 million in the brand and the opening of 7-Eleven stores in Israel, which will supply fast food and exclusive products to the Israeli market. Israel's growing and vibrant population and continued economic expansion "presents an ideal location for the growth of 7-Eleven stores.," said Joe DePinto, president and CEO of the global 7-Eleven organization. Following a memorandum of understanding signed between the two companies in November 2020, Electra will invest NIS 60 million in the brand by 2024. The company paid an undisclosed sum for the franchise upfront, and will also pay a percentage of its income on a monthly basis. 7-Eleven is a multinational convenience store chain based in Dallas, Texas, which operates and grants franchises and licenses to more than 77,000 stores in 18 countries and regions, including 16,000 in North America. The chain is known for its famous slogan, "Oh Thank Heaven For 7-Eleven," and is known for iconic brands like Slurpee, Big Gulp and Big Bite. In recent years, the chain has expanded into sandwiches, salads, toppings and fruit and protein boxes, as well as pizza, chicken wings and mini tacos. The company also operates the Speedway, Stripes, Laredo Taco Company and Raise the Roost brands, among others.

Drones Deliver Sushi and Ice Cream above Tel Aviv Skyline; The reality of sushi, ice cream and medicine deliveries by drones moved a step closer on Monday, October 11, as Israel’s National Drone Initiative launched its third phase. Flying over residential areas in Tel Aviv-Jaffa, Ramat Hasharon, Herzliya and Hadera, the pilot program conducted the third stage of eight tests it will run as it moves forward with its mission to create a national drone network. Over the course of the test, drones operated by the five companies participating in the program will carry out around 300 flights per day above open areas, conducting different kinds of tasks on flight paths assigned by the joint control system. Among the challenges, drones operated by Cando and High-Lander will bring sushi deliveries ordered by customers via a dedicated app and will deliver them to Tzuk Beach in Herzliya. The companies will also have a drone performing autonomous security missions for an emergency facility (Reading Fire Station) so that the drone located at the charging station is activated autonomously. In addition, SkyLinx and FlyTech will conduct a pilot program in which customers will be able to enter their order via a dedicated app and receive their ice cream via drones at Charles Clore Park (next to the Manta Ray restaurant). All participating companies, including Simplex and DownWind, will perform flights over urban areas in the center of Tel Aviv. HarTech Technologies Ltd. and Airwayz will perform flights over the Hadera urban area.

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
